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African Americans and the Arts

When Carter G. Woodson established Negro History week in 1926, he realized the importance of providing a theme to focus the attention of the public. The intention has never been to dictate or limit the exploration of the Black experience, but to bring to the public's attention important developments that merit emphasis. The theme for 2024 focuses on the importance of understanding and appreciating African American artists who have produced art infused with African, Caribbean and Black American experiences.

"For centuries Western intellectuals denied or minimized the contributions of people of African descent to the arts as well as history, even as their artistry in many genres was mimicked and/or stolen. Still, the unbroken chain of Black art production remains from antiquity to the present, from Egypt across Africa, from Europe to the New World. Prior to the American Revolution, enslaved Africans of the Lowcountry began their more than a 300-year tradition of making sweetgrass baskets, revealing their visual artistry via craft.


The suffering of those in bondage gave birth to the spirituals, the nation's first contribution to music. Blues musicians such as Robert Johnson, McKinley 'Muddy Waters' Morganfield and Riley "BB" B. King created and nurtured a style of music that became the bedrock for gospel, soul, and other still popular (and evolving) forms of music. Black contributions to literature include works by poets like Phillis Wheatley, essays, autobiographies, and novels by writers such as David Walker and Maria Stewart. Black aesthetics have also been manifested through sculptors like Edmonia Lewis and painters like Henry O. Tanner.

In celebrating the entire history of African Americans and the arts, the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH) puts into the national spotlight the richness of the past and present with an eye towards what the rest of the twenty-first century will bring. ASALH dedicates its 98th Annual Black History Theme to African Americans and the arts.

Start flossing your teeth! - Once teeth are close enough together you can start flossing your teeth, this helps to get rid of any plaque or bacteria that may be harder to reach.

Mardi Gras February 13th



The only thing predictable about Mardi Gras is it will fall on a Tuesday. Mardi is the French word for Tuesday, and gras means "fat." In France, the day before Ash Wednesday came to be known as Mardi Gras, or "Fat Tuesday." This day is also called "Shrove Tuesday, a name that comes from the practice of 'shriving — purifying oneself through confession before Lent.

When Christianity arrived in Rome, religious leaders decided to incorporate popular local traditions into the new faith rather than abolishing them. As a result, Mardi Gras season became a prelude to Lent, the 40 days of fasting and penance between Ash Wednesday and Easter (Resurrection) Sunday. In 2024, Mardi Gras will be celebrated on **Tuesday, 13 February**, the Tuesday before President's Day.

Today, Mardi Gras is marked by popular festivities and traditions including attending parades, catching beads, and eating king cake. Those faithful to the Christian faith will use this time to focus on preparing for Holy Week which ends with celebrations of Christ's resurrection on Easter Sunday.

Testing Schedule



This is the time of year high school students around the country are preparing to take standardized tests. These assessments are designed to give students and their parents insight into the student's current level of knowledge and skill. Armed with this knowledge, students, parents, and teachers can then begin to chart carefully which best suits their courses of study to enhance the student's ability to demonstrate his or her knowledge on the SAT or ACT for college admissions.

Students in the 11th and 12th grades will take one of two tests: SAT or the ACT. Both of these tests are used by universities and colleges to determine a student's readiness to do college level work. These two tests are very different and students should consider learning styles and gives them the best opportunity to achieve their goals.

History of Valentine's Day

Where did Valentine's Day originate from? The history of the holiday is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Still others insist that it was Saint Valentine of Terni, a bishop, who was the true namesake of the holiday. He, too, was beheaded by Claudius II outside Rome.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, he would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

Regardless of how this holiday began, it is now recognized as a time to share expressions of love. So, if you have not ordered flowers, made dinner reservations, or bought a card, there is still time! Floral arrangements and cards are available at the Navy Exchange just in time to meet any of your last minute needs. Wink! Wink!

Four Chaplain's Day — February 3rd

During World War II, four chaplains who had attended Chaplain School together at Harvard boarded the Dorchester en route to the Army Command Base in southern Greenland. Aboard the ship were 904 service members.

The four chaplains were Reverend George L. Fox, a Methodist minister, Reverend Clark V. Poling of the Reformed Church of America, Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, and Father John P. Washington of the Roman Catholic

Church. Their voyage began on January 23, 1943. At the time, German U-Boats were patrolling the area, and the convoy was on high alert. When a German submarine torpedoed the Dorchester on February 3, 1943, in the frigid waters off the coast of Newfoundland, chaos ensued.



Eyewitnesses recounted the chaplains' heroism, including giving their life jackets and gloves to other service members. They prayed with service members, assisting them into lifeboats. The four chaplains remained on the sinking Dorchester. Only 230 men were rescued from the waters.

Congress awarded the four chaplains the Medal of Honor in 1960.

February is National Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month (TDVAM). The theme for TDVAM 2024 is "Love Like That." You can help! Dating violence is more common than you may think, especially among teens and young adults: 1 in 3 U.S. teens will experience physical, sexual, or emotional abuse from someone they're in a relationship with before becoming adults. And nearly half (43%) of U.S. college women report experiencing violent or abusive dating behaviors.

Each February, young adults and their loved ones nationwide raise awareness about teen dating violence through Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month (TDVAM). This annual, month-long effort focuses on advocacy and education to stop dating abuse before it starts.

Selected by the love is respect Youth Council, "Love Like That," illuminates what "that" means regarding healthy and unhealthy relationships. We know that love is more than a feeling; no matter how you define it, it's essential to ensure you're on the same page with your partner about the definitions and boundaries of your relationship. Teens and young adults express their love for one another in many ways, which differ from person to person or community. The essential aspect of "Love Like That" calls on us all to create a world of positive actions to express and show healthy love in various ways. can make a difference by reaching out to young people in simple ways:

- Discussing the warning signs of dating abuse (all kinds, not just physical abuse),
- Creating a positive connection to the issue talk about the characteristics of healthy teen relationships, not just abusive ones – use statistics sparingly,
- Talking about how the media portrays healthy and unhealthy relationships, and
- Getting involved even if you don't have a lot of resources a casual discussion while in the car or bringing up the topic while doing chores are great opportunities to get the conversation started.

ASVAB*—Register NOW!*



You've heard taking the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) is your ticket to a great U.S. military career. If you're serious about joining the military, then it's time also to get serious about taking the ASVAB. Camden County High School will administer the ASVAB on Monday, March 18th. Student interested in taking the ASVAB should register with the school in the Guidance Office.

What is the ASVAB?

The ASVAB is a timed, multi-aptitude test, which is given at more than 14,000 schools and Military Entrance Processing Stations (MEPS) nationwide and is developed and maintained by the Defense Department (DoD). The ASVAB helps the Department of Defense not just determine whether you are a good fit to join the service, but also which service branch you might be best for and even what military jobs you can hold after you finish basic training or boot camp. The better your ASVAB score, the broader your options.

ASVAB Test Explained

The ASVAB includes tests in 10 areas: general science (GS), arithmetic reasoning (AR), word knowledge (WK), paragraph comprehension (PC), mathematics knowledge (MK), electronics information (EI), auto information (AI), shop information (SI), mechanical comprehension (MC) and assembling objects (AO). It provides career information for various civilian and military occupations and is an indicator for success in future endeavors, such as college, vocational school or a military career.



Your AFTQ Score Can Be Critical!

ASVAB test scores are broken down by the individual subtests and their composites. One of the most critical of these scores is the Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT) which is used to determine whether you are qualified to join the military service. Each service determines the qualifying AFQT score for enlisting in their service. The AFQT is comprised of your results in arithmetic reasoning, math knowledge and verbal expression (VE) times two. Your VE score is a combination of your word knowledge and paragraph comprehension scores.

Three Versions of the ASVAB

There are three distinctly different versions or formats of the ASVAB; the CAT-ASVAB (computer adaptive test), the Military Entrance Test (MET)-site ASVAB and the Student ASVAB. Each ASVAB has different benefits and limitations. Many potential military recruits take the CAT-ASVAB.



You can start preparing now by taking ASVAB practice tests . These tests will give you an idea of how you'll score and identify areas for improvement. Then, use printed or online resources and ASVAB study guides to learn how to prepare. For more information, contact the school guidance office about recruiter contact information.

FAFSA Night - February 6th

Getting into college is one thing, but finding the money to pay to college is another. For many military students and their parents, finding scholarship, grants, and other forms of financial aid can be overwhelming. One of the first steps to make in determining financial need is the completion of the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid or the FAFSA**. Be careful to avoid "FAFSA-looking" websites which may appear with '.com' endings and charge a fee for services. **Remember, this is FREE!**

It is strongly recommend that each student create a StudentAid.gov account before starting the FAFSA form. When creating this account, be careful to enter your name and Social Security number (SSN) exactly as they appear on your Social Security card. Setting up this account will give each individual an FSA ID number which is required to enter information into the FAFSA application.

2024-25 FAFSA® Form

On the 2024–25 FAFSA form, every contributor—anyone (you, your spouse, a biological or adoptive parent, or your parent's spouse) who's required to provide information on the FAFSA form—needs a **StudentAid.gov** account before accessing and completing their section of the online form. Contributors can access their **StudentAid.gov** account by using their individual FSA ID (account username and password).

Note: Contributors without an SSN can create a **StudentAid.gov** account to fill out their portion of your 2024–25 FAFSA form online.
